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

A Quick Overview of Expanded Learning in a Rural Area





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What's working for you, if you are already working with an individual school site or district?

- O tap into previous relationships with new out of school, paid programs; HS students
- O Make programs as interactive as possible to keep the kids attention after school
- O Survey with the site first number of students, age ranges
- O want to consider if it is be possible to bring interns/fellow to work with food corps support for school garden program
- O defined programs for 5 6 weeks for intern placements
- O games and going outside
- O ask providers/coordinators what the specific attention getter they use
- O get into one school or classroom first and then it snowballs
- O send a preview sheet and survey at the end
- having the site staff there to help with group management.
- o capacity- staff available to work with after school programs
- funding is there to do programming.
- great programming

UniquePlace based



- O finding out who to connect with at the district
- O staffing
- O we have been working during school day looking for pathway to after school programming
- O work easier with known partners; hard to get in the door
- O park access can have limited availability
- O distance from school to site
- O transportation; timing and bus availability
- O currently transportation is entirely up to the schools.
- O timing during summer is a challenge in some cases.
- O transitioning from school day programs to expanded learning space
- O staffing ratio to keep a 1:30
- O contracting process
- O funding getting pulled without warning (ELOP)
- O funding-limits for example: 3rd party or multiple agencies working together to work with students

Challenges and opportunities

- build relationships first, systems can be highly bureaucratic;
 - This is such an opportunity
- Kids coming and going during the expanded learning time
 - flexible programming
- Age ranges provided age, but sometimes you will have a Kinder and a 4th grader in the same program.
 - Make sure to have lots of scaffolding
- different requirements and channels of communication for individual schools and districts
- attend county STEM group; in some cases tiny meetings with limited involvement
